March 21, 2023 Meeting Discussion:

Opening Devotions: Tim Smith on Luke 24, which focuses on the Resurrection of Our Lord following his crucifixion and represents why we come to Church. Passage reflects why we need to pay attention and trust in the Lord.

Reports.

Thank You Cards.

Dr. Kris Albert – Kim Alloway to write Lorraine Schwartz – hemmed round tablecloths and will be working on the rectangular ones. Christy Bucks to write.

Minutes from February 2023 (Amy J. Schanbacher).

Trevor Hoffman corrected Christy's surname as well as correcting a surname in the Membership Report from Turnball to Turnbaugh. Jill Lordan motioned to approve the motion with the corrections, seconded by Wade Markel. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report (Wade Markel)

We are 17% through 2023 with income of \$39,332.32 (104% of the February 2023 budget) and expenses of \$36,868.75 (85% of the February 2023 budget). The current surplus/deficit for 2023 is at (\$6,077.83) deficit and we were budgeted to have a (\$11,334.53) deficit at the end of January. Motion to approve Treasurer's Report by Al Abruzzese and seconded by Trevor Hoffman. Motion passed.

Investment Treasurer's Report (Trevor Hoffman). Report accepted as written.

Membership Report (Pastor Janyce) No items requiring action. The reception for new members was nice and they discussed what/how Lutherans believe, Zion's history and learned about each other.

Pastor Janyce's Report. Report accepted as written with no discussion. No action items.

Parish Administrator's Report (Denise Moyer).

We currently do not have IT service. Denise Moyer obtained two (2) quotes. Doceo is \$250.00 per month and Treysta charges \$385.00 per month. We previously bought a chunk of time and used it as necessary – for example ten (10) hours and used it as issues arose. Advantage to using a service as opposed to doing it ourselves is consistency and having someone available for support as needed for upgrades problems, etc. We had a discussion regarding both quotes and how to handle. Denise to bring this issue back to the April meeting.

CYFM Report (Ryan Engleman).

Youth Group is to start fundraising for their National Youth Gathering trip as well as the fundraising for Ukrainian family. Letter from Charlie Roberts. We can send two (2) members to LT camp (future leaders). Chuck selected Ryan Engleman and Kaylee Holtzapple to go to this camp. First year is covered and there is a cost for second year -- \$300.00 per person. This is held at Camp Nakawa. There is \$2508.70 in the Campers Breakfast fund. Amy Schanbacher moved to use \$600.00 from the Campers' Breakfast Fund to pay the tuition for Ryan and Kailey to go to the second year. Seconded by Wade Markel. Motion carried.

Old Business.

Performance Reviews.

Al Abruzzese collated data from Congregation. Information given to Pastor, who is completing her portion. Meeting to be scheduled with Pastor Janyce at time all are available. Denise and Pastor Janyce completing staff reviews the week after Easter.

Call Committee/Rostered Leader.

Jill Lordan was finally able to get into the Ministry Site Profile account. Denise collated demographic information for the MSP, which is now included in that document. Survey created with QR code to gather information from the Congregation. Survey to be demonstrated to Congregation and requesting responses by March 31st to try to stick with original goal of finishing MSP in the first quarter. Call Committee to meet as a Committee in the near future – held off on meetings because of technical issues with the MSP and being able to access that document and/or input information.

Stewardship. Holding Pattern.

The three-dollar (\$3.00) a day challenge may be hard to track. Blurb for Bulletin was rewritten to try for Easter/Lent.

Constitution. Holding Pattern.

New Business.

Ukrainian Family.

Ryan Engleman: Involving them in church activities focused on their interests. For example, inviting the daughter, age 10, to the Club 4-5-6 Meetings. It is hoped that the smaller group will be less intimidating for her and welcoming to the congregation, Can a small group be formed around the Ukrainian family to acclimate them to the United States & Pennsylvania – ask Lori Wise if she would like a "core group: around this family. Core group could ultimately be expanded to help other families in need in York, Pennsylvania.

Denise Moyer: Lori Wise and her counterpart at Christ Lutheran have agreed to split the work/bills, etc. We will be disseminating money as they discussed so that both churches are equally helping with the family.

House is not 100% ready but will hopefully be ready soon. Goal is to have the family independent within 6 months. Need to garner from Lori what help she may need for when the family is actually here.

Easter Breakfast. Decided on a Continental type of breakfast. Only Andrew Doerr and Trevor Hoffman can commit to being here on Easter Sunday. Breakfast to be held at 9AM.

Church Directory. Pastor Janyce informed company that we are not in a place to do the directory at this time. We have an opportunity to do it in house at this time.

Palms for Palm Sunday (Remembrance for Lucille). Palms are covered for 2023 but will need for future years. We can discuss at a later time as this year is covered.

Visioning Homework:

Imagine an Easter Miracle – what would be really amazing to accomplish in the next 50 minutes?

- Finding the resources you need and finances for the Ukranian family.
- Clearly identifying the next steps/direction/goals to follow through on visioning.
- We need a consensus on short term goals and long term goals – a path forward.

Themes from Visioning Homework:

- Habituality Being more proactive.
- Stepping outside of comfort zone
- Relational

To address these goals/themes:

- You can't change the future without using the tools that created the present what got us here isn't going to take us where we want to go.
- Challenge the old paradigms.
- See worksheet from Kris Albert re: potential model we would like to follow.
- It is important to know that the Holy Spirit doesn't work in a linear fashion ... we have to be comfortable with being uncomfortable. We need to pay attention to where the Holy Spirit is calling us.
- We cannot rely on giving people directions or convincing people to volunteer. Service is not transactional. Service is relational and transformational. Focus should be on creating relationships.

Small Groups with a Purpose. See handout from Kris Albert.

- Grow in faith and relationships.
- Groups are flexible and collaborative not intended to be a permanent commitment.
- Group decides when they meet, how they meet, frequency and duration.
- Small group decides its purpose. Each group has the autonomy to define itself and its purpose. The group decides where to put it's focus.
- Avoid terms like committee and task force ... joining a small group will appear less arduous than joining a committee/task force.
- One of the unique things about small groups is that there are different levels of involvement and commitment.
 - * Transactional level others may learn something from material disseminated by group.
 - * Peripheral they help once in a while but you cannot necessarily count on them.
 - * Active members are just shy of being core team members, participate frequently. Occasional members are similar but not quite as "active".
 - Core Team glue that holds the group together. People that run the rest of the group – they can support one another and can step in for one another

- * The congregation is not a silo everyone fits into one of these categories somewhere. Groups should report back to the congregation to open up invitation to new people, teach the congregation about the subject of their passion and to request prayers for them/with them.
- When people "own" their groups, they do more work and promote the group on their own. Groups are emergent, organic and more healthy for this reason.
- * To form groups, send out invitations ... if you're interested, join us. This is how you live into your discipleship based upon your own strengths and weaknesses.
- How do you form these small groups?
 - You create relationships and learn what people are passionate about -- steer those people toward one another. You have to know more than the transactional date. Forming small groups is talking to people.
 - Council is a conduit congregation should create these groups based upon what the congregation is passionate about – those with similar passions should find each other and then work toward their passion.
 - Like minds will gravitate toward ones another and they will work toward the common goal of what they are passionate about. They will be able to use their gifts.
 - * It's okay for groups to be different in all respects size, frequency of meetings, etc. the idea is for likeminded people to come together and keep coming together to regenerate interest in the issue they are passionate about to continue service in that regard.
 - Just like a seed you plant, you need to nurture it and grow with it ... avoid the poverty trap (what if we don't meet the goal, etc.) and the rigidity trap (but this is always the way we've done it).

How do you begin – pick a subject that you know a number of people in the congregation are passionate about and gather those people – MINGLE. Let groups form from there ... you can extend the invitation to everyone but target specific people as well.

What did we accomplish – learning a new way to engage in the Church and serve the Church.

- We have to change the way we are thinking and creating relationships within the Church.
- Consider spending the rest of 2023 cultivating relationship?
 Food for thought.
- Think outside the box.
- Chat GPT cultivating relationships.
