The Light That Breaks the Darkness

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The winter solstice came on December 21st, —the darkest day of the year. On this day, the sun sets earlier than ever, and the hours of light seem to slip through our fingers. This dark day continues into the cold days of January. For many, including me, this physical darkness reflects the shadows we face in life: sickness, loss, unemployment, strained relationships, war, and the overwhelming injustices of the world. It is easy to feel burdened by a world that seems to grow colder and darker each day of this winter season.

But as Christians, we know this darkness is not the final word. Scripture offers us a powerful reminder of hope even on the darkest days. The prophet Zechariah spoke of a coming dawn, declaring:

"Because of the tender mercy of our God, by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace." (Luke 1:78-79)

No matter how heavy the night seems, God's mercy promises us a dawn. Just as the sun will rise again after the longest night, the Light of the World has come to shatter the darkness. The Apostle John testifies:

"The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world." (John 1:9)

This Light is Jesus Christ, who came to earth in the humblest of ways—as a baby in a manger—to redeem a broken and weary world. The darkness may be deep, but it cannot withstand the light of Christ. In Him, we find hope, peace, and strength to face our struggles. As Romans 15:13 encourages us:

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

We are reminded, especially during the Christmas and Epiphany seasons, that the birth of Jesus signifies a new dawn for all who believe. Even when we stand in the shadows of grief, uncertainty, and despair, we can trust that a day is drawing near when this darkness will break to light. As we hold onto our faith, we look forward to the promise of Revelation 21:4—a day when God "will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain."

Until that glorious day, let us walk by faith, remembering that Jesus has already overcome every trial, even the grave. He is our Light and our Salvation. He is our source of courage in the midst of darkness.

So, if you are facing your own "darkest day," take heart. The dawn will break, and the Light of Christ will shine in your life. Let His light guide you to peace, hope, and healing.

May the Light of Christ dwell richly in your hearts, and may you always remember that the darkness cannot overcome the Light.


Imagine a long, expansive, banquet table, with a place for everyone at the table. No one is turned away; everyone will enjoy the feast. This is a power-

Welcoming the Stranger: Supporting Refugees in America


In a world facing a global refugee crisis, over 120 million people are currently displaced—forced to flee their homes due to war, persecution, or violence. Of those, 35 million are refugees and 5 million are asylum seekers. Every day, nearly **40,000 individuals** are forcibly displaced. Despite common perceptions, poorer nations shoulder most of this burden. For example, Turkey alone hosts **3.6 million refugees**, while the United States ranks only **19th** in refugee admissions.

Who is a Refugee?

A **refugee** is a person who has fled their home country due to a **well-founded fear of persecution** based on:

Who is a Refugee?

- Race
- Religion
- Politics
- National origin
- Social group



How Refugees Come to the U.S.

Each year, the U.S. government sets a cap for refugee admissions. In the **2024 fiscal year**, approximately **100,000 refugees** were welcomed into the United States—a remarkable recovery compared to just **11,400** three years prior. Organizations like **Church World Service (CWS)** play a critical role in resettling refugees, including Lancaster, where around 580 individuals found safety and a fresh start last year.

What Does Scripture Say?

The Bible calls us to "practice hospitality" (Romans 12:13), meaning to "love strangers." Throughout Scripture, we see blessings when God's people welcome outsiders:

- Ruth's life was transformed through Boaz's hospitality (Ruth 4:13).
- Elijah witnessed God's provision through a widow's kindness (1 Kings 17:7-24).
- Abraham unknowingly entertained angels (Genesis 18:1-20, Hebrews 13:2).

God's command to care for the stranger is clear: we, as followers of Christ, have the opportunity to be His hands and feet.

How Can YOU Help?

Here are some simple yet powerful ways to make a difference:

- 1. **Pray** Lift up refugees and those helping them resettle.
- 2. Caring Cooks Provide a hot meal for a family on their arrival day.
- Pantry Pals Stock two weeks' worth of groceries (a shopping list is provided).
- 4. **Culinary Caregivers** Combine both: provide a meal and groceries.
- Kindness Catalyst Fund groceries for two weeks; others will shop and deliver.
- 6. **Welcome Teams** Join a team to provide **8 core services** that help families adjust to their new home.
 - Set up housing with essential furnishings
 - Cook/Buy culturally appropriate ready to eat meal when family arrives
 - Provide sufficient food supplies first 2 weeks
 - Pick up the family at Lancaster Airport
 - Take the family to the clothing bank
 - Enroll the adults in an English language program
 - Take the family to their health screening appointments
 - Enroll the children in school

Zion is currently helping refugee families in 3 ways:



- Assisting 4 Afghan families (25 people) already settled in York (URGENT NEED)
- Combining forces with other churches to make up a team called Mustard Seed Ministry to resettle a Sudan Family expect arrival shortly
- Working to create a Welcome Team to be ready to help a new refugee family yet to be identified

- 3.2 Treasurer's Report Report submitted by Wade Markel
- October 2024 Operations (does not include preschool): Receipts (Giving) \$43,502.41, Expenses \$45,344.91, Surplus/Deficit -\$1,842.50.
- YTD Operations: Receipts (Giving) \$384,777.88, Expenses \$475,049.34, Surplus/ Deficit -\$89,535.55.
- YTD Budget: Receipts (Giving) \$369,869.17, Expenses \$443,789.17, Surplus/Deficit -\$73,920.00.

- October 2024 open plate and giving increased due to one-time gifts that came in during the month. Denise Moyer reported that she is unsure if some of those gifts were planned. Some of the gifts may also come from members' required minimum distributions. It is also believed that the Stewardship Campaign may have contributed to the increase in giving.
- Income is improving and moving in the right direction.

3.5 Pastor Report

Report submitted by Pastor Kevin Stout

- Thank you to Jim Rowlands, Jen Lau, Chris Owens for filling in for Pastor Kevin while he was out.
- Pastor Kevin inquired how his time off should be handled. He is officially allowed 4
 weekends off a year. Pastor Kevin had time off this year to go to funerals and
 marriages. It was shared that some people in the congregation were upset or concerned when Pastor Kevin was not in service due to his time off. The reason for
 these feelings is unclear.

Christy Bucks suggested not having communion when Pastor Kevin is out, but he believes that would not make a difference as the meal is blessed and the words are different. Paying for substitute pastor could be an option but can be costly. Pastor Kevin could ask lay leaders within the congregation to provide the sermon, but he would still be present. This option would relieve his workload of preparing a sermon. Strong lay leaders are available within Zion.

It was shared that members should not come to church for Pastor Kevin, but rather to come to encourage other people and worship God. Anmarie Hazelton suggested posting online when Pastor Kevin will not be in services so people are aware, but Zion has not done that historically and other churches do not do that.

- Morrie Hooper had surgeries. Pastor Kevin visited him, and he is doing well
- On Sunday at 2pm Lori Wise, Byamba Stout, and Pastor Kevin met with 4 Afghan families who are new to York. Church World Services does not have sponsors for them. There is a search for churches that can sponsor them. Sponsorship would include support with ESL, jobs, vehicle, and food. Lori Wise already took them to the food bank. The Service Team is aware and will keep everyone informed. A plan is being developed to help the families.

- Byamba Stout made Afghan tea and the men were impressed by Zion's China.
- An individual who was formerly sponsored by St Johns church served as an interpreter for the families
- Christmas schedule is out: Fireside on Tuesday, December 17 and two Christmas eve services at 7pm and 10 pm. The children's play will be held the Sunday before Christmas on 12/22 and directed by the Doerr family.
- Discussion of using electric versus real candles during Christmas services. The 7pm uses electric candles and the 10pm uses real candles. Pastor Kevin will talk to Juliann Roderick and the Thursday team about the use of candles.
- 12/22 10 am service will hand out candles for the children's play.
- Fireside service to be held 12/17 at 7 pm. Christy Bucks asked for donations of refreshments. Fellowship Team will provide hot cocoa. Council will bring refreshments. Bring your own chair.
- 3.6 Parish Administrator's Report submitted by Denise Moyer
- Denise handed out the budget that was passed at the Congregation meeting.
- To date from the Stewardship Campaign, 107 estimates of giving cards were returned totaling \$336,358.60 in pledges. Simply Giving is not included in this number. This is the highest number since 2003.
- \$483,000 is needed to balance the budget.
- More giving is needed.
- Pastor Kevin distributed a document of church members who did not return their estimate of giving card. Council members were assigned to call them as a followup.

Teams Debrief

- It was suggested that a social media post or Facebook event can be created for the week prior to Teams meetings as a reminder. Team leaders can also email Team members to remind them.
- Service Team update: February 10 & 11 and April 7 & 8-Volunteers needed to supply meals for the tutoring program. Service Team should submit a request to Denise to put this need in the bulletin.
- A standard form will be provided to Teams to make requests to Denise.
- A process and form for requesting purchases will be available in December.

New Business

Congregation Meeting Debrief

- The meeting went well.
- A nay was shared during the Annual meeting regarding the change in church conference. The concern was that Zion is shifting away from a less fortunate area where our presence could be a positive impact.
- Pastor Kevin shared that Zion is still participating in the tutoring program, and he
 will be on the Board of the Salvation Army which will allow for more opportunities
 in the city.

Opening Prayer

Pastor Kevin provided an opening prayer for the meeting.

Determination of the Quorum/Call to order of meeting

Dave Schneider indicated that there is a quorum for the meeting and called the meeting to order.

Opening remarks

Christy Bucks provided opening remarks and a prayer, highlighting the role of Zion in the surrounding community. In addition, Christy recognized the role of Pastor Janyce in the history of Zion and the transition to Pastor Kevin, as well as the growth of Zion through Teams, We Are Wednesdays, the church picnic, community band festival, VBS, Youth Gathering, and church giving, among other activities, to live out Zion's mission and the revitalization of the church. Christy also shared a story about learning to trust growth, to be slow and steady, accelerating when needed, and trusting the process. Christy thanked the congregation for attending the Congregation Meeting.

Meeting minutes and reports

4.13 Nominating Committee Report

- The need for Council members was announced at services and people were asked to serve.
- The Committee nominates the following persons for a first 3-year term starting in 2025: Jim Rowlands, Karl Peckmann, Kelly Kessler, Andy Parr, and Rose Hartzell
- The Committee nominates the following persons for a second 3-year term: Wade Markel
- Christy Bucks indicated that there is an opportunity for the congregation to nominate other people and voting is available. No other people were nominated.
- New Council members Jim Rowlands, Karl Peckmann, Kelly Kessler, Andy Parr, and Rose Hartzell, as well as returning Council member Wade Markel, stood to be recognized.

Motion to approve by Suz Smith, seconded by Elaine Mann. Motion carried.

2025 Budget presentation and vote

Trevor Hoffman presented the proposed 2025 budget, highlighting the following.

- The Finance Team began working on budget in June 2024, with the goal of a balanced budget. However, a balanced budget was not achieved but Zion is much closer to a balanced budget than the past 3 years.
- The initial 2025 budget draft included about a -\$45,000 deficit. The final 2025 budget draft approved by Council includes a -\$33,803 deficit, which is a \$55,000 improvement from the 2024 budget.
- Income is estimated to be \$731,493, which includes an increase of \$73,489 in Current and \$5,115 in Open Plate for a total increase in those categories of about \$78,000.
- The preschool is expecting the same income as the 2024 budget.
- The Finance Team, and specifically Denise Moyer and Adam Strayer, worked to identify possible areas of savings. They feel the expenses are as tight as possible without reducing staff and eliminating programs.
- The 2025 budget includes a 3% increase in staff salaries.
- The property budget was increased by about \$14,000. As the building ages, more things will need to be replaced. One expense may be a new HVAC unit. However, the 2025 budget does not have enough to cover the full cost of a unit.

- The Finance Team spent several meetings analyzing healthcare options outside of Portico for staff and received multiple quotes from 2 different brokerage firms.
 The Finance Team ultimately decided to stay with Portico for 2025 but selected a lower coverage plan changing from gold plus to silver plus, which resulted in savings.
- The preschool has a balanced budget for 2025.
- The combined deficit over the 5-year period is -\$75,612.
- The Council has requested that the Finance Team be very clear that we cannot run
 a deficit forever as Zion will run out of money. Zion has been able to fund the deficits in the past few years through COVID relief funds, drawing funds from the investment portfolio, and growth in the investment portfolio. But we cannot count
 on that going forward.
- Zion needs to meet or exceed projected income levels in this 2025 budget. To
 meet these goals, we will need to for those who give regularly to increase their
 giving, those who do not give regularly to start giving regularly, those who do not
 give to start giving, and for members to invite people to church to increase attendance/membership.
- Losses will be covered by investment funds, if needed, but those funds are limited.
- If giving is not on track to meet or exceed the budget as of June 2025, Zion will need to reduce staff in 2026.
- Budgeted \$78,604 increase in Current and Open Plate.
- Received 96 estimates of giving, which is 18 more than 2024 and those members pledged about \$80,000 more than what was pledged in 2024.
- The Finance Team requests the congregation to follow through on pledges, to return an estimate if you have not, and to invite new people to attend Zion.
- Following the approval of the budget by Council, the Finance Team received final health insurance information. The updated information decreased our expected benefit costs by (\$3,486) for 2025. We would like to request a motion to adjust the budget to decrease the budgeted expenses by that amount. This would bring the 2025 budgeted deficit to (\$30,317).
- Questions from congregation members include the following with answers from Trevor Hoffman:

* How do we estimate income for budget?

Budget cannot be based on pledge cards. Council and the Finance Team decided on 20% increase over last year's giving. This number has changed and will be a 17% increase for the final budget.

* Seeing significant increases in benefits year to year, what can the congregation do to stop or slow increases to benefit costs?

The Finance Team looks at other insurance providers.

* How much runway is there to use the investment income?

Expecting a 1-2 year runway to use investment income, noted as about 1.5 years on page 16 of budget. Unrestricted funds can never be more than 50% or less than 25% of our budget.

* Why did the preschool surplus decrease?

Surplus decreased the last few years, because salaries were increased to retain staff.

Motion to approve the 2025 budget with the -\$33,803 deficit by Jim Rowlands, seconded by Erin Ream. Motion carried.

Christy Bucks thanked the Finance Team, Trevor Hoffman, and Adam Strayer for their work on the budget.

Proposed constitutional changes report and vote

Jim Rowlands provided an overview of the constitutional changes that need to be implemented to align the constitution with the ELCA Model Constitution (mandatory and non-mandatory paragraphs). Constitutional changes take two votes and are up for a final vote this year.

Second and final vote for non-mandatory changes regarding the following:

- There is a non-mandatory paragraph in the Model Constitution regarding endowment funds. The current Zion constitution does not contain the paragraph. Zion calls endowment funds "Restricted Funds". The task force believes Zion should define restricted funds in the constitution as noted in the proposed paragraphs.
- The model constitution contains a non-mandatory paragraph on the use of a non-Lutheran temporary pastor in cases of Synod shortages. The task force recommends the inclusion of the proposed paragraph in the Zion constitution.
- The model constitution contains a non-mandatory paragraph which allows and governs the use of meetings held by remote communication and defines "Ex officio". The task force recommends the inclusion of the model constitution paragraphs as written.
- The task for recommends adding parliamentarian to the listing of officers to match current practice and noting the treasurer and investment treasure need not be Council members.

- The task force recommends changing the means by which the youth representative is appointed to Council. The current constitution stipulates the youth shall select the representative. Current practice is to have Council select a youth based on CYFM recommendation. The youth is to be at least a sophomore in high school and no beyond their sophomore year in college. The proposed wording states that if there is no voting member of the congregation that meets the criteria, Congregation Council shall appoint one to represent the youth of the congregation.
- The task force recommends giving the Council president the option, versus requirement, to fill a vacancy on Council. Existing paragraph C12.01 specifies Council to be no more than 12 confirmed members.
- The task force and finance committee recommend providing an allowance in the constitution to allow Council to approve non-budgeted repair or replacement of capital equipment that failed. Council can enter contracts up to 5% over what was approved in the budget. Council can enter contracts for more than 5% of unrestricted funds with congregation approval, such as in cases of emergency repairs.
- The task force recommends inclusion of the non-mandatory paragraph from the model constitution which allows Council and committee meetings to be held remotely. This brings our current practice into compliance.
- The task force recommends restructuring the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions as separate independent documents rather than the current structure where they are incorporated into a single document. Each have different approval requirements.

Motion to approve by Jen Lau, seconded by Amy Schanbacher. Motion carried.

First vote on the following non-mandatory changes to the Zion constitution:

 Changes to the constitution require congregation approval by a majority at a congregational meeting and approval by a 2/3 majority at the next congregation meeting. They must also be approved by the Synod. The task for recommends removing this paragraph from the constitution and relocating the information in the bylaws.

Motion to approve by Jill Lordan, seconded by Elaine Mann. Motion carried.

The first vote for non-mandatory change to Zions bylaws regarding the following:

The current bylaws state that the treasurer shall not reimburse any person or organization for sales tax in excess of one dollar imposed on the purchase of goods or services by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
 Any reimbursement for sales tax in excess of one dollar must be approved by Council. The proposed change states that any person

or organization purchasing goods or services on behalf of the congregation shall try to utilize the tax-exempt status of the congregation to avoid the imposition of such tax.

- The term committee shall be synonymous with teams with the proposed change to Chapter 13 Congregation Committees to Congregation Committees/Teams.
- The duties of non-mandatory committees will be changed to state in the event there is no Personnel Committee/Team, the duties will be performed by the Lead Pastor and the Executing Committee/Team from Council.
- Removal of the following committees/teams: Worship & Music, Christian Ed, Stewardship, Parish Health, Social Ministry, and Joyful Noise Board.
- Five new proposed teams and their functions, including Faith Formation Team, Outreach Team, Property Team, Fellowship Team, Service Ministry Team.
- Proposed change in constitution acknowledges Council may form organizations within the church, which are separate but affiliated with Zion, such as the memorial gardens and the preschool. Organization will be approved by majority vote of Council. An organization's initial board will be approved by Council and subsequently board members of the organization will be elected in accordance with the constitution of the organization. The organization will prepare a constitution within 6 months of the creation of the organizations. Council will provide oversight of organizations.
- Joyful Noise Preschool's constitution was moved under Zion's bylaws.
- Council approved the preschool and columbarium. First vote change to acknowledge organizations and moving JNP out of constitution.

Motion to approve by Suz Smith seconded by Rose Hartzell. Motion carried.

Zion resolution updates in 2024 that do not require vote:

- Council approved an employee handbook.
- The preschool board and Columbarium board are established organizations of the church.

New business

Mutual Ministry-Pastor Kevin

- Pastor Kevin shared that he is not sure when Zion had an active mutual ministry, but it has not been around for a number of years.
- Mutual Ministry serves to review mission statement and if congregation fulfills the mission; Serves as a mediator for pastor, staff, and congregation.

- Mutual Ministry would be made up of 6 members for 2-year terms.
- Three volunteers for 2025 to serve for their first 2-year term: Penny Heisley, Karen Engleman, Chris Owens. Three more volunteers will be identified for 2026. Volunteers will rotate every 2 years.
- Question from congregation member: Understood that mutual ministry is for pastor, and personnel committee is for staff. Will they now be combined?

Answer from Pastor Kevin: There will still be a personnel committee made up of the executive team and pastor.

7.2 Lay Voting Members for Synod Assembly

- Need 3 volunteers. No vote required for volunteers.
- Michelle Sine and Karen Bissell volunteered.
- Still need 1 male, 1 youth, and a person of diversity (person of color or English as a Second Language).
- Volunteers to attend two Synod Conference Assemblies and the annual meeting. The annual meeting is on June 5 (evening) and June 6-7 (daytime). The agenda is still a draft, but time is usually 8:00/30 am through dinner. Saturday ends by dinner. Lunch is provided. The purpose is to call a bishop with several other elections. Meeting to occur at St. Matthews in York, PA in their auditorium.

7.3 North York Conference

- Pastor Kevin shared that Zion has been part of the York Conference which includes churches below Route 30. He has started to go to the North York Conference, which includes churches in the Shiloh, Dover, and Roundtown areas.
- Pastor Kevin believes Zion is a fit better with the North York Conference and would like Zion to attend. This conference change requires a vote.
- This change of conference was first considered under Pastor Janyce.
- Even with this change, Zion will not leave the WELL, mentoring program, and other activities downtown,
- Question from congregation member: Explain why it is better fit and the implications.

Answer from Pastor Kevin: There are no implications. York city churches do not work well together, and many do not attend. Pastor Kevin believes firmly that a conference should work well together. North York works very well together.

- Jen Lau shared it would be a benefit to change to the North York Conference for cooperative ministry. Working with other congregations is a big deal and extremely important to develop ministries together. Several other congregations in North York are in the Central York School District with Zion. In addition, some North York congregations are smaller and do not have resources which Zion could share with them.
- Question from congregation member: What does the conference do and what is it for?

Answer from Pastor Kevin: It is a geographic or historical partnership to discuss common ministries and share challenges and solutions. They get together once a month to worship, fellowship, and discuss.

Motion to approve Zion moving to the North York Conference by Jill Lordan.
 Seconded by Kelly Kessler. Motion carried.

7.4 Family in Need

Pastor Kevin shared that he met someone who works with an Afghan family in York who needs help. A meeting is scheduled with Pastor Kevin, Lori Wise, the referring individual, an interpreter, and the family to identify and discuss how Zion can help. The Service Team is aware.

Thank you to out-going council members

Christy Bucks shared a thank you and recognition of the following outgoing council members: Kim Alloway, Krista Zellers, Jill Lordan, Al Abruzzese, and Regina Peckmann.

Ryan Engleman was also thanked and recognized for serving a year as youth representative on Council. Alex Engleman will be the new youth representative.
