At Zion, we are reminded of God's call to love and welcome the stranger among us. As it is written, "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2). The arrival of four Afghan refugee families in our community is not just an opportunity to serve, but a sacred calling to extend Christ's love to those seeking refuge. Jesus Himself taught us, "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35). As we walk alongside these families, providing support and encouragement, we do so as an act of faith, reflecting the compassion and grace that God has shown us.

Welcoming Afghan Refugee Families to York: A Community of Support

At Zion, our hearts have been touched by the opportunity to help welcome four Afghan refugee families to our community. As they settle into life here in York, we have joined together to offer support, guidance, and kindness in many ways.

So far, the outpouring of generosity has been overwhelming. Thanks to the kindness of many, we've been able to collect and distribute clothing and furniture to the families. We've helped them navigate the process of accessing the York Food Bank, provided transportation to medical appointments, and assisted with understanding medical insurance. When the heat wasn't functioning in their homes, we were able to connect with others who helped them lower utility bills and generously donated space heaters to keep them warm.

On February 9th, a group from Zion, alongside other community members, welcomed the families with a meal of Afghan food in the Fellowship Hall. During this event, we learned about a cultural tradition that Afghan men and women do not gather together at the same table in public settings. It was a privilege to sit and listen to the family fathers, with the assistance of Aziz Nazari, who graciously served as a translator.

Here's a look at the families we are helping:

The Amiri Family Father: Amir Amiri Mother: Jamila

Sons: Pamir (18), Arash (13), Abuzar (11), Basit (8)

Daughters: Wasima (21), Saida (15), Bibi (5)

The Amiri family hails from the Panjshir Province of Afghanistan, a place Amir recalls fondly for its beauty. Amir worked as a mechanic for the U.S. Army, and his family enjoyed playing volleyball and football (American soccer). After the U.S. troops left and the Taliban took over Kabul in 2021, they were forced to flee. Amir is currently working in sanitization but hopes to return to his trade as an auto mechanic. The family is eager to learn English and, with the help of the community, is focused on building a brighter future in the U.S.

The Attai Family
Father: Mohammad
Mother: Zamina

Sons: Zaki (21), Nasrat (19), Irfan (8), Mosa (3)

Daughters: Zamzama (16), Nilofar (14)

Living in Kabul, the Attai family loved their city but lived in constant fear of the Taliban. Mohammad worked as a professional singer and a delivery driver for the U.S. Army base. The family feels safe in the U.S. and is slowly adjusting to their new life here. Mohammad hopes to find work as a musician, and Zamina is eager to learn to drive and improve her English. Their children, especially Nasrat, who already knows some English, are excited to attend school and build new lives.

The Amar Khil Family

Father: Habib Mother: Homaira

Sons: Tawhed (14), Tawfeq (13), Tamjed (10), Majeed (4)

Daughter: Kayanet (9)

Habib worked as a wastewater treatment plant operator for the U.S. Army and enjoyed playing Snooker in his free time. Snooker is a billiard type of sport originating in India and popularized by the British Army. After the U.S. Army left Afghanistan, Habib took his family to Qatar, but with the Taliban's presence there, they faced challenges finding work. Habib is now looking for a career in electricity or HVAC. He has asked for prayers as they adjust to their new life, especially in securing stable work and education for his children.

The Nazari Family

Father: Aziz Mother: Salma Son: Husam (3)

Daughters: Amena (7), Raihanna (5)

The Nazari family is from Kabul, where Aziz worked as a Team Leader for the U.S. Army and enjoyed gardening. With a Bachelor of Science in Economics, Aziz is well-educated and speaks excellent English. They fled Afghanistan due to the Taliban and now feel safe in the U.S., where Aziz is taking classes at York Technical Institute. Salma, who has experience as a tailor, is eager to learn English and find work. Aziz requests prayers for his family's continued adjustment and for a better life in the U.S.

As a church family, we are so grateful for the opportunity to support these families during their transition to a new life in the U.S. We continue to ask for prayers for their well-being, for their adjustment to their new lives, and for their success as they build a future in York.

Thank you to everyone who has already contributed time, resources, and kindness to this effort. Let's continue to come together as a community to show these families the love and support they need as they start this new chapter in their lives.

Children, Youth & Family Ministry



Here we are again. Another month brings another topic. What does our ministry look like in the future? How do I minister to the youth in this congregation and the ones I come across in my travels as well as other events I attend. The world we live in today is different from the world we lived in two months ago. Each day I read a different news story about changes being made. Changes that negatively affect our everyday lives whether you realize it or not.

Then that is what sticks out the most to me. A lot of the things that are happening in our country and in our world do not directly affect our everyday lives. I have had multiple conversations with those that are directly affected by these changes, and they are scared. I am scared for them. They ask me to pray for them and their families and I pray every day for them. I pray that enough change can occur to correct the atrocities that some of these friends and family face (homelessness, food insecurity, job loss).

We had Youth Group Sunday this past week that I am writing this and the kids are beginning to notice the changes. I thank Pastor Kevin for letting the Holy Spirit guide him over the past several weeks with the messages that he has shared with us during the sermon. It is important to know where God would stand on all these decisions being made by people who will never be affected negatively by these decisions that they are making. The youth are listening, and they are asking questions, good and difficult questions. The youth of this congregation are beginning to understand what is happening. I highly recommend to the families of these youth that you engage them in these conversations.

We spent our time during Youth Group Sunday, across all three groups, discussing 1 Corinthians 13: 4-7. We spoke about what it means to be love in the world. Then I handed them the same reading with the words "love' and 'It" removed and I had them write in their

own name. I would encourage you that are reading this article to do the same. The one thing is, when you replace love with your name, read it OUT LOUD. The reading hits differently when you hear your own name along with "is patient" and "is kind". This passage is a fantastic checklist into how you live your everyday life. I want you to really think about each line. Where did you excel? Where did you fall short? I guarantee that we all fall short. The only person that can be all these things at the same time is Jesus. God is Love. All we can do is do our best. Where we fall short, we can pray and ask God for that help to be more like Him.

I hope you take the time and do this exercise. Feel free to stop me at faith formation or before or after worship one of these Sundays. Let me know your thoughts. God Bless all of you and see you on Sunday.





Lenten Book Study & Soup Meal Wednesdays March 12—April 12 6:00 - 7:30 PM


